BROKEN BOXES: A Decade of Art, Action, and Dialogue, curated by Ginger Dunnill and Josie Lopez, features large-scale installation, sculpture, video, and a robust programming line-up celebrating the work and ideas of 23 artists who have contributed to Dunnill's Broken Boxes podcast. The exhibition celebrates ten years of the podcast of the same name and amplifies the collective strength of contemporary artists.

Focusing on interviews over the past four years, the exhibition features large-scale installations by renowned artists and includes floating metal "jingle clouds," a vibrant parade float uplifting matriarchs, a colossal wolf forged from community care, brilliant mirrored tapestries honoring lives lost, a monument to Trans rights, and much more. Exhibiting artists include recipients of the Pulitzer Prize, the MacArthur Award, Guggenheim Fellowships, and Creative Capital Awards, as well as many participants in multiple international biennials. Each of the featured artists engages their own cultural experience and elevates activism within diverse communities.

Broken Boxes-the podcast, the exhibition, and the exhibition catalog-centers around bringing artists together in dialogue with each other. By opening up the conversations across communities, groups, art practices, materials, and shared spaces, Broken Boxes demonstrates how artists are forging new forms of action.

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

Wampum / DSW J&JJ

Celebrate the first New Mexico performance of *Wampum /* DSW J&JJ, an ongoing project by Cherokee/ Muscogee artist Elisa Harkins. Inspired by sheet music of Indigenous music notated by Daniel Chazanoff during the 20th century, Harkins sings in a combination of Cherokee, English, and Muscogee (Creek) to electronic dance music. As an act of Indigenous Futurism, this performance combines disco and Indigenous language in an effort to alter the fate of these endangered idioms through active use, preservation on pressed vinyl, and radio broadcast.

WORKSHOP:

LGBTQIA+ Inversions of Power
