- 5. Chair report**
 - **Council of Chairs update** – Main focus of the CPC is recruiting
 - FH have five candidates that are going to be interviewed in the coming weeks.
 - APOA representative presentation
 - Next month October 5, 2022 meeting is the last meeting for the hybrid meeting. The last two meetings November and December will be on zoom.
 - Presenters are APS chief, Counselor Renee Brown and FH CPC partnered with a non-profit organization young Latina women mana to teach about crime and prevention.
- 6. APD update – Lt. Ken Johnson**
 - Trends and pop projects look where the crime is popular. The main corridors are on Tramway and Central to Juan Tabo.
 - Large increase in calls for service in violent crimes. For the last two months the trend had decreased.
 - August Statistics
 - Commercial robberies – 16
 - Residential robberies – 1
 - Carjacking- 1
 - Robbery to an individual – 1
 - Auto theft – 66
 - Warm up thefts – 0
 - Residential burglaries – 8
 - Auto burglaries – 31

- Shots fired for calls for service – 36
- Felony arrest – 73
- Misdemeanor arrest – 37
- Felony warrants – 65
- Misdemeanor warrants – 31
- Pick up robbery suspect on Eubank and Central at home depot – 1

7. Detective Shaun Willoughby, President - Albuquerque Police Officers Association

- Ninety-eight percent of APD officers belong to the CPOA. (Never begin a sentence with a number).
- The Union represents Patrol Officers up to Lieutenant. Deputy Commanders, and Area Commanders are not represented by the Union.
- Officers are represented in officer involved shooting, and disciplinary actions. The APOA would bring an attorney for the officer at the site.
- Negotiate on behalf of the APOA to increase wages, benefit packages, and working conditions.
- The City is having trouble retaining APD officers as there is generally low morale, due mainly to the increased scrutiny brought upon by the Court Approved Settlement Agreement.
- Albuquerque's weak-on-crime approach is also contributing to the low officer staffing.

8. Sonya Marquez Crime stopper liaison PowerPoint presentation (1:12:38)

- In operation in Albuquerque since 1976
- Heavy utilization of social media for tips
- Info scrubbed of personal information
- There are different ways to report to Crimestoppers.
- Rewards vary on situation

9. Lt. Glenn St. Onge Bernalillo County LEAD (Law Enforcement Assisted Diversion)

- Back in 2020 they received 170 referrals
- In 2021 they had 173 referrals.
- Currently the year today date referrals are 172, and 34 active clients, of which not one person has returned to prison.
- They are in nine counties in NM participating in the program.
- Funded for three years under federal grants
 - Behavioral health tax
 - State funding
 - Congress appropriated \$500,000 to the LEAD program
- The way the program works
 - Anyone can make the referrals; however, the person needs to know about the referral.
 - Have to be in the Bernalillo county resident
 - They need to be 18 years of age
