I volunteer and I guess I'm MRCOG's staff, that's what I --5 CHAIR FREEDMAN: Yes. 6 7 MS. GABALDON: I've got volunteered to give you a very brief update on the establishment of account. 8 I know it's been a long, tedious, uh, process, so back 9 and forth emails from the bank and MRCOG, but we're 10 11 seeing the light at the end of the tunnel. 12 According to the bank who was communicating 13 with us last week, COG should be set up by the end of 14 this month. 15 CHAIR FREEDMAN: Oh, terrific. 16 MS. GABALDON: And once the account is set 17 up, and they let us know that it's final, that it's 18 finally final, the process of the transfer of the funds 19 can commence, and we will let Kendra know or, uh, whoever we're communicating with, uh, when that will be so the 20 process can start quickly. 21 22 Uh, I heard you say you were -- there was 23 some issues with, uh, expenditures. I don't know if, uh, they're immediate or imminent, or if you need to get to them right away. Uh, but until the funds are transferred, 25

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um, unless there's an emergency of expenditure of funds,

    previous meeting.

                  And, um, the thought was to try and get it
    done through our -- through our funds that we had
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available from both the city and the county, uh, to have her, uh, work, the legislature.

The contract is for \$35,000. And so it met the threshold, if you will, of, of not necessarily having to go through the formal process, but to give her a contract to do the work.

Um, the dilemma was that, as we were moved through it in our haste, and, and I will say, I'll take responsibility for that, on my haste, to try and get it done during the holidays so that we could hit the ground running once the legislature, uh, started.

Um, we found out that both, um, our fiscal agent didn't have a -- basically, the accounts that she just reported on. Um, and the city and the county, uh, both had their structures that they have to go through for these kind of contracts.

So in visiting with, um, with, uh,

Commissioner Baca, Commissioner Baca decided, "Well,

look. Why don't I just step in and let's just do the

contract, and I'll pay for it with, with her own

discretionary funds that each commissioner has to get the

ball rolling and to get the contract in place?"

And so the county staff, that with Commissioner Baca, again, um, basically put together a contract on behalf of the collaborative to the county's

process so that when you get her on contract to start the
work.

So she's officially on contract, uh, for the collaborative to do, uh, to work for us, uh, as it relates to the legislative session.

Um, for full disclosure as well is, is

Commissioner Baca, uh, asked her to do a couple of things
on behalf of the county, uh, I think to evaluate a couple
of programs that quite frankly relate to the legislature
in the sense of how there might be some opportunities to
support some other, uh, low income, um, housing projects
or programs that the legislature may be considering.

Um, very, uh, from my understanding, very minor work and, and the work has been done. Um, and she - Commissioner Baca and I talked earlier today, but her primarily function will be is to represent the collaborative during the session.

Um, so I, I wanna make sure that at least from the collaborative standpoint that the process of writing it to the county just seemed to be the most experexpedited method of getting her on board to getting her to start doing the work.

Um, she is coming in next week. And, um, and so I've asked Kelly to reach out to all of you. Um, just

1 to touch base with each of the members of the
2 collaborative.

- And, um, and then I, you know, um, Talia and
 I talked about it. Our Chair and I talked about, she
 wanted me to maybe help her sort of be the center of, if
 you will, a conversation with, with, with Kelly to ensure
 that she's working on behalf of our programs [inaudible
 0:16:15].
 - Um, and so I'll be sort of the contact with Kelly. So if people wanna have a conversation or, or are concerned or, or just wanna get an update, um, from this, you know, [inaudible 0:16:25] on like collaborative, let me know, and, um, we'll be happy to make sure that we get you in touch with, um, with her.
 - And, uh, and look, I, I mean she knows the legislature well, she- she's worked for many years up there. She's got a good sense of, of what the issues are. Um, I think she's been touched base with Joseph, and I don't know. Uh, I asked her, Marcos, to visit with you. I don't know if she's done that yet, but --
 - MR. MARCOS: Oh yeah. [Inaudible 0:16:51].

 She's coming in next week and I think, uh, we'll try and

So the 500, 500 as well was set up 5 in the initial resolutions that you set up to form the 6 7 collaborative, and then the 1.7 million was the capital allocation that came to the county to -- for the county 8 to work with the collaborative [inaudible 0:18:14] 9 project, which we've been [inaudible 0:18:16] and then 10 11 separately [inaudible 0:18:19]. 12 Now, each of the two were asked a hundred million to float in for, uh, the gap financing and 13 14 different projects. 15 CHAIR FREEDMAN: Mm-hmm. MR. MARCOS: And then the county has also 16 17 asked for another million dollars in operational funds 18 for the state to match what city and county putting together [inaudible 0:18:37] to match that as well this 19 for operations [inaudible 0:18:41]. 20 21 CHAIR FREEDMAN: Oh, terrific. Okay. 22 MR. MARCOS: So there's those different pots 23 of funding that we've identified. So the crucial thing is 24 to work with the work [inaudible 0:18:48] to set up the
