

Boosting Local Jobs

- \$25,000 in Local Economic
 Development Act Funding
 will help Pajarito Powder bring
 50 jobs to Albuquerque with an average salary of \$63,000/year.
- \$250,000 in Local Economic Development Act Funding provided to Blue Halo will bring 64 new jobs to Albuquerque with an average salary of \$90,000
- \$500,000 in Local Economic Development Act funding will support Kairos' \$300M investment in a new facility, creating 100 new jobs in next-generation nuclear power. (2022)
- \$25k in Local Economic Development Act funding will support Los Poblanos'
 \$2M expansion. Created 24 new jobs. (2021)

- \$125k in Local Economic
 Development Act funding will support Affordable
 Solar / Gridworks expansion.
- 90 new employees at a \$70K average salary. (2021)

Job Training Albuquerque (JTA) Total program successes:

- Advancing local workforce development ecosystem
- Will bring together local workforce leaders to enhance leadership skills, strengthen networks, and promote equity
- Fellows will address workforce challenges and develop strategy for upward mobility

Business Resource Center

In October, the City of
Albuquerque opened the Business
Resource Center which houses
the Small Business Office and the
Minority Business Development
Agency. The new center will allow
both programs to better serve
Albuquerque and New Mexico's
entrepreneurial ecosystem
offering streamlined services and
bolstering the local economy from
a single accessible location.

- The Small Business Office awarded \$200K in grants to 84 businesses, helping cover the costs of repairing or replacing 154 windows
- The Small Business Office provided technical assistance to 410 businesses in FY24
- The Small Business Office hosted 4 Small Business Resource Fairs, across 4 city quadrants, connecting business owners to over 30 organizations and over nine City departments
- The NM MBDA served over 500 businesses from diverse backgrounds. Int the fourth year of operation (July 2023-2024) the Center has added over 200 more businesses to its portfolio
- The NM MBDA secured funding for additional centers in Las Cruces and Las Vegas
- Lending Tree ranks New Mexico 8th in the nation for minorityowned businesses

Albuquerque Film Office

- Serving as the conduit between the film industry, the community, and the City of Albuquerque
- Construction is underway on the Media Arts Collective, a stateof-the art training hub for future filmmakers, creating a workforce development pipeline for the state's booming film industry and a contributing economic revitalization for Downtown
 Albuquerque
- The 2,000 square foot facility will include a soundstage, edit bays, computer labs, makeup, and hair stations, and a cutting-edge green screen that allows for nextgeneration special effects.
 Classes are expected to begin in 2026
- Albuquerque has major Qualified Production Facilities available for incoming film projects including: Cinelease Studios, Hannover Studios, Quixote, NBC Universal, Netflix studios and the Studios at Journal Center
- Home to 203 local film ready vendors
- Film Industry Direct Spend in NM FY24 \$740 Million
- Industry media wage of \$56,000
