Message from Chief Medina

Hello Albuquerque, I hope everyone is doing well! Wanted to kick off with some positive news regarding our Auto Theft statistics. In the first two months of this year, we have seen a 40% decrease in auto thefts compared to the same time frame last year. This is a significant decrease, and one of the biggest I've seen in my years with the department.

There is a lot that we can attribute that decrease to including a successful Bait Car Program, more awareness to auto theft, making significant auto theft arrests, and vigilance from the community as more people are safely securing their vehicles.

We recently saw a slight uptick in thefts of specific Honda models in our Northeast and Foothills area commands, so we are urging the public to please take extra precaution in helping us prevent theft.





Our Central Corridor Operations continue to be a success. During a three week period, our officers arrested 112 people. APD's GANGS, FAST and Narcotics units conducted a proactive operation with the assistance of the Field Services Bureau Proactive Response Teams (PRT). In addition to the 112 arrests, officers cleared 106 felony warrants and 38 misdemeanor warrants. The operation focused on open air drug use, drug trafficking, warrants and maintaining a visual presence along the Central Avenue corridor.


Our Criminal Investigation Division recently wrapped up a Missing Persons Operation in an attempt to locate as many missing people as possible during a one-day operation. Out of 129 cases, officers, detectives and professional staff located 55 people. Of those, 14 were juveniles and the division was able to successfully resolve 46 cases. I'm very proud of the work of this division and am looking forward to the success of more future operations to come.

On our Community Engagement side of the department, we are looking forward to an event next month and hope you'll spread the word with your family and friends.

Valley CPC Meeting Recap for February

Hello Everyone,

The Valley CPC meeting Re-Cap for February 27, 2025, Mayor Tim Keller spoke on a variety of issues including the City's pickup schedule on the scooters for transportation, the official promotion of Lt. Sanchez to Cmdr. for Valley Area Command and an update on the City's crime stats report. He indicated warrant operations, shot spotter operations, license plate readers, our high clearance rate on homicides, and ACS as bright spots, and spoke upon changes in AFR (Albuquerque Fire Rescue) policy, and the possible re-instatement of speed cameras.

Cmdr. Sanchez reported the monthly crime statistics, noting a decrease in comparison to the same time last year. Currently, the valley is experiencing a decrease in burglary, violent crime and armed robbery, with the exception of shoplifting, which is increasing.

On the final presentation from Cmdr. Jonathan Viers and Lt. Troy Nicko from the APD Training Academy. They detailed their role and what the Academy outlines in the training programs, changes in certification of officers, evaluation of the programs, the Civilian Policing Academy, and more.
