ROBBERY DOWN 50% SINCE 2018

We recently announced robberies are down 50% since 2018 and this goes to show the progress we are making as a department in terms of tackling crime.

We have a robust DIVRT team made up of mostly civilian staff members focused on retrieving video surveillance footage and other digital evidence that assists sworn personnel in their investigations.

By having this civilian team, it frees up time for officers and detectives to focus on their caseloads. Crime Stoppers, APD's detective academy, and internal information sharing amongst divisions have had the strongest impact in identifying and charging repeat or violent offenders, such as those committing robberies.

And to kick off the month, we have an exciting community event coming up. This will be a largescale Coffee with a Cop event partnering with the Dunkin' Community Cruiser. The event will be held on September 10, at the University Substation from 8-11:00a.m., and there will be FREE coffee and donuts.





Crime Prevention Safety Tips

Teach children to be safe at home and while out. "Stranger Danger" can be a difficult concept to grasp as children encounter strangers daily; a better approach is to teach children about good "friends" or "helpers" who assist during emergencies such as: Teachers, Police Officers, Firefighters, Doctors and Paramedics

- CHILDREN SHOULD KNOW THEIR FULL NAME, ADDRESS AND PHONE NUMBER. TEACH CHILDREN THAT ADULTS SHOULD NOT ASK
- TEACH CHILDREN THAT ADULTS SHOULD NOT ASK CHILDREN FOR HELP, ADULTS ASK OTHER ADULTS FOR HELP.
- DO NOT DROP OFF CHILDREN AT SHOPPING MALLS, MOVIE THEATERS OR PARKS FOR UNSUPERVISED TIME.
- NEVER LEAVE CHILDREN UNATTENDED IN VEHICLES.
 TELL CHILDREN IT IS OK TO SAY "NO" TO SOMEONE THEY DON'T KNOW OR SOMEONE WHO IS MAKING THEM FEEL UNCOMFORTABLE.
- TELL CHILDREN WHICH NEIGHBORS THEY MAY VISIT.
- TEACH AND REINFORCE THE "BUDDY SYSTEM."
 KNOW THEIR FRIENDS AND FRIENDS' PARENTS.
 MAKE SURE THEY KNOW HOW TO CALL 911 IN CASE
- OF AN EMERGENCY AND POST OTHER IMPORTANT NUMBERS.

TEEN SAFETY TIPS

- Always let someone know where you are at all times and keep your parents or guardian updated if you won't be back on time.
- Never wear earbuds when you're walking alone at night. Criminals are always on the hunt for people who are distracted and easy targets.
- Do not post everything on social media, especially of where you are at the exact moment. Consider posting after you're no longer at that location.
- Never reveal your personal information to any "stranger" you connect with on social media.
- Never meet with anyone you "just met" online. If someone asks to meet you, tell your parents or guardian right away.
- Put your cell phone away. You're an easy target when you're focused on the conversation you're having and NOT your surroundings. Those calls and texts can wait!
