CPTED

Crime Prevention through Environmental Design Albuquerque Police Department – Crime Prevention Unit

The CPTED approach advocates that effective use of a built environment can lead to a reduction in the incidence of crime and an improvement in the quality of life for communities. Crime Prevention through Environmental Design is a successful crime reduction strategy that can be applied to business, industry, residential and public properties.

The following components encompass a holistic CPTED approach to design:

Natural Surveillance: The ability to see and be seen. This creates an environment in which it is apparent that a potential criminal is likely to be detected. This strategy includes the removal of visual barriers such as fences, shrubs, and walls.

Access Control: The placement of physical barriers to make it more difficult for potential offenders to commit crimes. Limiting the number of ways to get on/off the property; locks, windows, and security are included in this prevention method.

Territorial Reinforcement: Creates a sense of ownership and empowerment by members of a community to monitor and protect their neighborhood. CPTED suggests that physical design can contribute to a sense of territoriality that promotes a greater sense of responsibility by residents in protecting their "territory," (e.g. enhanced security awareness, reporting, reacting) which thereby presents an increased perception of risk by offenders.

Maintenance/Activity Support: A well maintained space appears to be "owned" by someone and will attract legitimate law abiding users while discouraging illegitimate or disruptive users. A positive community image is a significant deterrent to criminal behavior.

Safety Tips to Prevent Catalytic Converter Thefts

Catalytic converters are designed to remove toxins from vehicle emissions. The devices contain small amounts of three precious metals: platinum, palladium and rhodium. In recent years, the price of these metals has soared to record levels, which means that catalytic converters can provide a substantial return to a thief for just a few minutes work. Replacement and repair can run to many hundreds of dollars, loss of revenue for a business and increased insurance costs.

Vehicles with high ground clearance, such as some 4x4s, vans and SUVs, are especially vulnerable.

The following provides crime prevention advice for vehicle owners.

- Whenever possible, park your vehicle in a garage
- Alternatively, park in a location that restricts access to the underneath of your vehicle
- Consider the installation of additional security lighting that would result in a thief being seen around your vehicle by neighbors and or passersby.
- If your catalytic converter is of a “bolt on” type consider having the bolts welded
- Consider the installation of CCTV to protect your vehicles
- Identify/etch your converter using a proprietary marking and registration system and advertise this fact using windows stickers.
- Consider the use of a “Cat Clamp”. The clamp surrounds the converter with a cage of aircraft grade stainless steel, locking the converter to the vehicle chassis.
- Improved fencing can help deter a theft. In addition, and if practical, try and block access to vulnerable high ground clearance vehicles with ones of lower clearance.

CATALYTIC CONVERTER THEFTS

Prevent Catalytic Converter Theft

What is it?

- It is a critical component of your car's exhaust system and can cost up to \$2,000 to replace.
- Thieves target it because it contains expensive metals, has a street value of up to \$200, and removal can take less than 1 minute.

Theft Prevention Tips

- Park in a garage or a well-lit area.
- Engrave your VIN number into your catalytic converter.
- Install a catalytic converter protection device.
- Install a car alarm to set off when it detects vibration.
