Guns stolen from vehicles prevention tips

A gun safety group analyzed FBI crime data from 337 cities across 44 states — covering a combined population of about 63 million people — between 2013 and 2022. The report, from Everytown for Gun Safety, revealed that, on average, at least one firearm is stolen from a car every nine minutes in the United States.

Guns stolen from cars often go from legal hands to the illegal market, where they are too often used to carry out other crimes, including assaults and homicides. But these thefts are preventable, as is the heartbreak and long-lasting trauma of the violence they can cause," Sarah Burd-Sharps, senior director of research at Everytown for Gun Safety, said in a statemenStoring a gun in your car requires careful consideration to ensure safety and compliance with local laws. Here are some key tips:

Use a Lockable Container: Store your gun in a lockable container, such as a gun safe or lock box. This adds an extra layer of security and helps prevent unauthorized access.

Keep It Out of Sight: Place the lock box in a discreet location, like under the seat or in the trunk. This reduces the risk of theft by keeping the gun out of plain view1

Separate from Ammunition: If possible, store the gun and ammunition separately. This can help prevent accidents and is a legal requirement in some areas.

Secure the Lock box: Use a cable to secure the lock box to the frame of your car. This makes it more difficult for someone to remove the entire box.

Check Local Laws: Always ensure you are following local laws and regulations regarding firearm storage in vehicles. Laws can vary significantly by location. "Gun owners must securely store their guns – whether in the car or in the home – to save lives.



Definitions

Burglary – Unauthorized entry of any vehicle, watercraft, aircraft, dwelling or other structure, moveable or immovable, with the intent to commit a felony or theft therein.

Robbery – Consists of the theft of anything of value from the person of another or from the immediate control of another, by use or threatened use of force or violence.

Motor Vehicle Theft – Consists of a person taking any vehicle or motor vehicle intentionally and without consent of the owner.

The Atlas One app will automatically send you an alert when a public safety issue occurs near your current location, or places you care about, such as your home, school, or office.



Hope everyone is enjoying their summer with some needed time off with family and friends. We have already had a busy summer and have some key areas we are focusing on.


