We are in the middle of summer and I hope everyone is doing well. I would like to thank our community for voicing their concerns and identifying criminal activity. This really does help to determine where to allocate police resources to be effective and make a difference in reducing our crime.



I'd like to highlight a couple successful operations that we are currently conducting. We recognized that our city transportation could be safer. We focused resources on the city buses and city bus stops. This operation will be going throughout the month and we were successful in seizing drugs, making numerous felony arrests, and clearing numerous felony warrants.

Our Central Ave. Corridor operation is yielding successful results as well. By focusing at San Pedro Dr up to Louisiana Blvd, and the alley to the south, we have seen a reduction is shootings as well as hoping to clear the area of the high volume of loitering, criminal trespass, and narcotics activity. It's usually these activities that lead to aggravated assaults and robberies. The alley in this area is currently being fenced/gated off and resources for living and treatment are being offered numerous times a week to the less fortunate.

Your officers are working extremely hard balancing the proactive operations we are conducting with calls for service, and providing exceptional community engagement.

Lastly the Phil Chacon Memorial Substation is still on track to be completed in the fall, where will be re-opening to the community.



TIP HOTLINE: 505-843-STOP

Albuquerque Metro Crime Stoppers is a community program that relies on anonymous tips to solve crimes and to locate fugitives from justice. Without anonymity of callers, the program cannot be effective.

Crime Stoppers pays rewards only for anonymous tips. Tipsters who identify themselves are not eligible for a reward.

Crime Stoppers has sole discretion to decide the amount of any reward to be paid, from zero to \$1,000.

Crime Stoppers will pay rewards only for tips given directly to it. Any tip given to another source, such as law enforcement, will not be eligible for a Crime Stoppers reward.

Crime Stoppers does not pay rewards to any person who has a legal duty to assist in the arrest of suspects and fugitives.

Felony Gun Crime + Arrest = Up to a \$1,000 CASH REWARD
