

our Albuquerque/Bernalillo County (ABC) Comprehensive Plan, we have taken tangible steps to ensure our city remains welcoming and supportive for all.



Through conversations and commitments from community members, local organizations, businesses, and government, we develop and support practices and policies that enable people of all ages to engage with and stay connected to their communities.

Reflection and Summary

Albuquerque is dedicated to making our city more inclusive, innovative, and safe for everyone. We are focused on reducing isolation, increasing community engagement, and preparing for changing demographics. Since launching the One Albuquerque Age-Friendly initiative, our efforts have grown significantly. On November 21, 2017, AARP enrolled Albuquerque in the Network of Age-Friendly Communities, making us the 189th member. Membership in this network provided us with valuable metrics and guidance, helping us build on our existing strengths.






The City of Albuquerque's
Department of Senior Affairs
launched the Age-Friendly
Albuquerque initiative during the
COVID-19 pandemic, which brought
both challenges and opportunities.
Virtual meetings increased
participation in planning sessions and
focus groups. Additionally, changes in
meal delivery allowed staff to
hand-deliver surveys, resulting in
over 1,300 responses.

Our needs assessment revealed that Albuquerque has many age-friendly practices and resources, and we have worked across departments to share our vision and enhance awareness.

Age-Friendly Albuquerque unites various departments, organizations, and individuals to build a community for every stage of life. Increased visibility and collaboration have



driven the accomplishments highlighted in this report.

The most significant achievements include developing a robust infrastructure to support the plan, with an active Age-Friendly committee and dedicated staff. The plan's integration into City structures ensures its continuity. The Age-Friendly Action Plan, publicly vetted and authorized by City Council, has been incorporated into Albuquerque's Comprehensive Plan.

City Council Resolution R-21-221 mandates quarterly progress reports to the Council, creating a sustainable foundation for the plan.

While our plan initially addressed all eight domains of livability, our implementation experience leads us to focus on three key areas: Housing, Transportation, and Civic Participation & Employment over the next three years. This strategic focus leverages our momentum while benefiting

all domains of livability.

The One Albuquerque Age-Friendly Action Plan update reflects the importance of supporting sustainable housing options, improved mobility, and opportunities for community engagement and employment.

This commitment reflects Albuquerque's promise to be the best city for families of all incomes, ages, and life stages.

AARP Livability Index

Albuquerque is in the top half of communities in the United States. A comparison of the AARP Livability index score from 2017 to the AARP Livability Index score in 2023 shows that Albuquerque's overall score improved by 2 points from 52 to 54. Albuquerque saw an increase in its transportation, environment, opportunity, engagement, and housing scores.

Progress Achieved

YEAR ONE

Age Friendly Action Committee Activated

An 18-member Age Friendly Action Committee comprised of community members and DSA staff has been established. This Committee, led by the Strategic Program Manager, meets monthly with members representing various organizations, including the University of New Mexico Retirees Association, NM New Elder World (NM-NEW), Senior One, The Medicare Corner, AARP New Mexico, Older Rainbow Community of Albuquerque (formerly SAGE ABQ), Area Agency on Aging (AAA), and Albuquerque Police Department (APD). It also includes small business owners, non-profit leaders and retired professionals. Committee members share age-friendly priorities with community networks and establish connections to advance plan initiatives.





Creating Robust Network for Healthy Aging

Fifty-four community partnerships were established. The committee informs partners and other ambassadors about the progress of the Age-Friendly Action Plan and equips them with targeted information to enhance their advocacy efforts in making Albuquerque age Friendly.

Study Shines Light on Aging Population

Study initiated by City Councilor Klarissa Peña provides recommendations and strategies to help support Albuquerque's aging population and urges City leaders to make aging a priority for the community and to engage younger generations in preparing for longer lives.

Community Planning Area Assessments with City of Albuquerque Planning Department

Community Planning Areas (CPAs) are the City's new long range planning approach. The Age-Friendly initiative connects older adults to the CPA



process by involving them in walk audits and tabling sessions at the DSA senior and multigenerational centers in each of the city's 12 CPAs.

This ongoing cycle helps identify and recommend changes to policies, regulations, and implementation projects.

Promoting Older Adult Socialization through the City's ABQ311 app

City of Albuquerque's Department of Technology & Innovation created easy access navigation links to Senior Affairs informational web pages to promote cross-collaboration between programs ensuring that individuals can find the information and services they need without facing barriers or confusion.

City Council approves Council Bill R-21-221

Introduced by City Councilor Klarissa Pena in November 2021, Bill R-21-221 was passed unanimously by City Council on January 19, 2024. This resolution approved the One Albuquerque Age-Friendly Action Plan and directed DSA to use the Aging Population study to implement the plan.

This established a reporting structure to ensure progress on the Age-Friendly Action Plan is reported to the city's governing body on a quarterly basis, ensuring the plan's continuity through future administrations.

YEAR TWO

Investment in Sustainable Infrastructure to Support Age-Friendly Action Plan

DSA created the Strategic Program Manager position, and realigned the supervision structure to include the Data Analyst II position, and newly created Outreach Coordinator positions.

These changes support the Department's work related to Resolution No. R-21-221 and specifically facilitate the implementation of the One Albuquerque Age-Friendly Action Plan.

Innovative Employment Project Launch

A pilot "return-ship" program tested at Manzano Mesa Multigenerational Center was designed to replicate traditional internship. However, this back-to-work pilot program presented an alternative opportunity for an older adult returning to the workforce to update and build on their existing skills.

Promoting Older Adult Employment

In partnership with the New Mexico Department of Workforce Solutions, Veterans Affairs, and the City of Albuquerque's Human Resources Department, DSA collaborated on recruitment efforts, education on the City's hiring process and emphasizing the need to employ older adults.

Two job fairs were held at DSA senior centers with over 25 businesses and organizations participating along with the City's mobile human resources unit providing on-site applications and information.

Economic Development through Older Adult Entrepreneurship

In collaboration with the City's Economic Development Department, DSA launched initiatives to support Albuquerque's local economy by empowering older adults with the skills and knowledge to make a significant economic impact. Building on the success of the inaugural Senior Artisan Fair, DSA offered a series of free workshops for older adult entrepreneurs.

These workshops covered topics such as starting a business, securing start-up financing, navigating the digital marketplace, resume writing, and exploring ways to continue earning in the later stages of life.

Expanding DSA's capacity to Serve Older Adults and People with Disabilities

The DSA Outreach Coordinator formalized community partnerships to enhance DSA's capacity and resources and address issues affecting older adults, such as isolation. Memorandums of



Understanding (MOUs) were established with various organizations including Mandy's Farm, a local non-profit focused on expanding job training for disabled individuals, and the OneABQ Fund.

These agreements enable DSA to seek sponsorship support for events like the Ageless Artisan Craft Fair, Tech Fair, and Age-Friendly Summit.

Committee connecting with State and Local Advisory Councils

The Age-Friendly Action Committee engaged with various City committees including the ADA Advisory Council, Older American's Act Advisory Council, Senior Affairs Advisory Council, Mayor's Youth Advisory Council and Para Transit Advisory Board.

Additionally, the committee expanded its network to include a member of the New Mexico Aging and Long-Term Services Department Policy Advisory Council, the Downtown Echo Project and Community Policing groups to

advocate for the well-being and safety of older adults in the community.

Age-Friendly Leadership Academy

DSA participated into the inaugural cohort of the National Age-Friendly Leadership Academy which brought together leaders from across the country to share ideas and innovations within a national network of Age-Friendly Communities.

Additionally, DSA, along with City of Albuquerque Youth and Family Services Department - Area Agency on Aging and Planning department staff, developed an online caregiver survey. This survey is designed to inform the Area Agency on Aging's Area Plan, Planning's CPAs and DSA's program planning efforts.

Age-Friendly Action Plan embedded in DSA Strategic Plan

DSA developed a Strategic Plan to evaluate and enhance operations aiming to provide the highest level of customer service for the growing number and most vulnerable older adults in the community.

The Department will focus on the following five goals:

- **01.** Deliver Critical Services Efficiently
- **02.** Meet Evolving Demand for Services
- **03.** Become a Data-Driven Organization
- **04.** Build Internal Capacity
- **05.** Be the Trusted Voice for Older Adults in the Community

Expanding access to Healthcare-Medicare Fairs

DSA launched four coordinated events at Senior/Multigenerational Centers during the Medicare open enrollment period. By bringing Medicare brokers together to provide critical and timely information, the initiative effectively increased access

to healthcare options for the public. The inaugural event saw participation from 1,000 older adults. This successful, easy access approach has become an annual event for DSA during Medicare open enrollment.

Improving access to Technology

Since the onset of the COVID pandemic, DSA has provided technology-based services to nearly 1,000 older adults. This includes loaning 21 smart tablets, conducting 289 classes, generating 256 YouTube technical video views and offering 420 one-on-one coaching and helpline services.

DSA also participated in the first annual Internet Resource Fair coordinated by the City of Albuquerque Broadband Program Manager.

To further enhance technology access for older adults in Bernalillo County, DSA continues to expand its efforts through the Laptop Loaner program, additional classes and hands-on instruction, and upgrades to computer labs in the centers.

National Accreditation of DSA Centers

As part of a 5-year cycle, four DSA centers: Manzano Mesa Multigenerational Center, North Valley Senior Center, Palo Duro Senior Center and Los Volcanes Senior Center were re-accredited by the National Council on Aging, National Institute of Senior Centers (NISC).

With over 11,000 senior centers in the U.S., fewer than 200 are accredited, representing less than 2% highlighting the exceptional quality and commitment of these DSA centers.

Albuquerque Housing Forward Initiative-ADUs allowed by code throughout the city

DSA actively advocated for sustainable affordable housing, missing middle housing and for the needs of older adults through the Housing Forward initiative. This advocacy included



supporting the recommendation for Accessory Dwelling Unit (ADU) changes to the Integrated Development Ordinance (IDO) which were adopted by City Council.

The Age-Friendly Action Committee continues to engage on the City's Housing Forward initiative and is now focusing on policy areas crucial to older adults, such as the affordability of property taxes and utilities.

YEAR THREE

Expanding access to Nutrition- Expanding Meals Program

DSA partnered with the Area Agency on Aging to expand the 60+ donation/ free lunch program, while still continuing low-cost, à la carte options.

This expansion included three

additional centers, aiming to reduce food insecurity and address the rising foods costs experienced by older adults.

Reaching Multigenerational Caregivers

DSA developed and launched a series of caregiver workshops at senior and multigenerational centers to address the needs of diverse family caregivers.

The workshops include:

- Caregivers Toolbox: A series of classes covering Caregiver Self-Care, Community Resources, Managing Difficult Behaviors, Dementia, and Advance Planning.
- Caregiving for an LGBT Person: Offered by the Older Rainbow Community of Albuquerque (formerly



SAGE ABQ), this workshop helps participants understand the needs of the LGBTQIA+ community and provides guidance on best practices for caregiving.

 Powerful Tools for Caregivers: An evidencebased education series offered by the Family Caregiver Center of NM, a new Albuquerquebased nonprofit.

This six-session course empowers caregivers with tools to manage stress, improve communication, and enhance overall well-being while caring for their loved ones.

Age-Friendly Action Plan goals embedded into CABQ Comprehensive Plan

DSA collaborated with Council Services to integrate the Age-Friendly Action Plan into the CABQ Comprehensive Plan update, ensuring that its elements are enshrined in the City's Rank 1 planning document.

The included elements focused on planning, land use, and zoning.

Leveraging the Age-Friendly Network

DSA received two technical assistance grants from AARP to advance the City's Age Friendly initiatives. The first grant allowed DSA to work with ECONorthwest on developing a housing equity workshop, involving the Office of Equity and Inclusion (OEI) and the Planning Department in the project.

The second grant supported DSA's collaboration with Smart Growth America/Transportation for America on a policy research project related to transportation, which will inform the update of the Age-Friendly Action Plan update.

Expanding Access to Healthcare-Vaccine Uptake

DSA was awarded a \$100,000 grant from the National Council on Aging to boost COVID-19 and Influenza vaccine uptake.

This was awarded for a proposal that utilized a unique approach to expand outreach and share credible information about the benefits of vaccinations. The goal was to increase vaccine uptake and access to other healthcare services for underserved older adults and people with disabilities.

By engaging health ambassadors like

Community Health Workers, and staff, DSA and its partners administered over 1,500 vaccines and reached nearly 400 individuals through outreach and education.

Affordable Housing Mapped

DSA collaborated with the City's Department of Health, Housing and Homelessness (HHH), and the Planning Department to develop an interactive map of affordable housing units in Bernalillo County.

This map displays all known affordable housing units and serves as a valuable resource for diverse groups, including the DSA Information and Assistance team, City planners, and city-wide program staff.

Housing Choices for Albuquerque's Older Adults report published

Technical assistance provided by AARP NM State Office supported DSA's efforts on Mayor Keller's Strategic Housing Initiative workgroup, which focused on housing considerations for Albuquerque's growing older adult population. DSA collaborated with RL Mace Universe Design Institute to produce the report, Housing Choices for Albuquerque's Older Adults.

Volunteers in Action (VIA) Program launched

DSA launched the Volunteers in Action (VIA) program in 2022 to offer meaningful volunteer opportunities to people of all ages.

As part of the DSA Strategic Plan, this robust volunteer program is crucial for expanding access to essential services.

While our AmeriCorps Seniors programs (Foster Grandparent Program, Senior Companion Program and Retired and Senior Volunteer Program) continue to rebound from the COVID-19 pandemic, focusing on younger volunteers has



proven highly effective. Notable intergenerational projects included a 10-week intergenerational project at the Barelas Senior Center community garden with ACE Leadership High School and the assembly of 2,500 Vial of Life Kits by 56 volunteers. These kits, developed in partnership with Albuquerque Fire Rescue, contain lifesaving information that first responders can access quickly during emergencies.

New Mexico Grown: Award-winning innovation in Nutrition

DSA's Nutrition program received the Sprout Award for its achievements with the New Mexico Grown program. This grant supports meal programs in purchasing locally grown fruits, vegetables, and meats. The award recognizes efforts to enhance internal capacity for using local produce and meats in meals served at DSA centers, meal sites, and through home deliveries.

This initiative promotes fresh food options, supports the local economy and agriculture, and reduces DSA's carbon footprint.

Expanding Access to Healthcare-Dental Health Education

DSA partnered with New Mexico Department of Health (NMDOH) to pilot a dental health education program at four DSA centers. The project involved NMDOH dental practitioners providing education and guidance regarding the importance of proper dental hygiene to members of the centers.

Age-Friendly Summit: Defying Ageism

DSA hosted the first Age-Friendly Summit: Defying Ageism. The event, which attracted over 80 participants, featured a thoughtfully planned afternoon and evening focused on ageism – often considered the last socially acceptable "ism." The summit explored the impact of ageism on employment, healthcare, and interactions between younger people and older people.

Improving Digital Literacy

DSA partnered with Teeniors, a group of tech-savvy teens who provide one-on-one technology coaching to older adults, along with other technology groups to emphasize the importance of technology training and digital literacy for older adults. A total of 72 one-hour workshops were conducted, covering a range of topics including phone tech support, Android and iPhone basics, checking voicemail, using the internet, working with apps, Windows Laptop,


MacBook, and Chromebook basics, transferring information between devices, smartwatch basics, and working with Zoom. Initially funded through COVID/ARPA funds, DSA has continued to fund these partnerships using operational dollars to ensure ongoing access to digital literacy for older adults.

National Council on Aging Programs of Excellence Award

DSA's virtual technology program and services for older adults, along with the annual Senior Tech Fair, received a Programs of Excellence Award from the National Council on Aging's National Institute of Senior Centers. This recognition was featured on the national stage during the Annual National Council on Aging Conference on February 14, 2024. The Senior Tech Fair offers a range of technology classes, demonstrations, and information booths covering topics ranging from smartphone basics, social media, telehealth, online shopping, and more. To provide a diverse array of resources for older adults, the department partnered with over two dozen local businesses and organizations, including student volunteers who assisted with many of the tech classes.

ABQ Ride Free Fares

After a nearly two years of a pilot program, numerous data reports, and community feedback, the City Council approved an ordinance making all services provided by ABQ RIDE fare-free. Albuquerque is now one of the largest U.S. cities to implement a Zero Fare transit program, following Kansas City, Missouri which introduced a similar program in 2020. ABQ RIDE serves an average of 23,800 riders daily, 88% of whom live in households with an annual income of less than \$35,000. By eliminating bus fares, the City of Albuquerque is ensuring all transit-dependent riders have access to this essential service.









Although all domains of livability are important, the One Albuquerque Age-Friendly Action plan will focus on three domains over the next few years: Housing, Transportation, and Civic Participation & Employment. Other domains of livability will be integrated where possible through strategies within these three focus areas. The plan will use the Respect and Inclusion and Communication and Information domains as guiding principles.

Respect and Inclusion Guiding Principles

In the inital One Albuquerque Age-Friendly Action Plan the goal in the Respect and Inclusion domain aims to create a responsible and inclusive community that recognizes the contributions of people of all ages and abilities. Therefore, whenever possible:

- Use Inclusive Language: Incorporate the phrase "all ages and abilities" in communication. This language demonstrates a commitment to Age-Friendly planning and implementation.
- · Avoid Ageist Language: Ageist language should be

actively avoided and addressed when it occurs. Ageism is pervasive; we can model anti-ageist behavior, and raise awareness through advocacy and education.

Communication and Information Guiding Principles

The inital One Albuquerque Age-Friendly Action Plan goal in the Communication and Information domain is to keep people informed and connected with their communities through easily accessible and understandable information. Therefore, whenever possible:

- Use 'all of the above approach": Dissemination of information should be planned and executed by using an "all of the above" approach—including print materials, despite the prevailing belief that "everything is done online." Not everyone has access to computers, internet, and/or digital literacy training.
- Use City's Safe Harbor languages: Information should be communicated in the City's safe harbor languages, and should be accessible to all citizens. with valuable metrics

To increase opportunities for people of all ages to get involved in the community in ways that are meaningful to them.
