
us toward new milestones year after year. Together, we work hard to ensure these opportunities have a lasting, positive impact on our community.



Over 165 Elementary and high school kids participated in APD's Camp Fearless and Junior Academy.



The Junior Mentor Program (JMP) hired 129 interns who worked at 52 locations this summer, with total intern wages amounting to \$243,147.24.

Our Programs

Youth Connect Programs break free from the confines of traditional playgrounds, extending to all interests and enthusiasms.


Regardless of one's age or preferences, our wide-ranging selection of over a hundred programs offered ensures that there's a perfect fit for everyone, catering to families, teenagers, and those who are young at heart. Here are some examples of our diverse programs that cater to a myriad of passions.

Kids Cook: Kids Cook was offered in 14 summer programs and taught kids the value of nutritional meals and empowered them to prepare and cook meals safely.

Nature in Your Neighborhood: Visited 11 community centers and showed kids what kind of nature and wildlife is in their own communities.

Farm in your Neighborhood: Collaborated with 8 community centers and taught kids ages 10-14 what kinds of produce grows in their communities.

Throwback Roller Skating: Throughout the summer, this program traveled to different summer programs to provide 1,494 youth the unique experience of roller skating with their friends at their summer programs.



Teen Nights: 273 Teenagers looking for a night out with friends enjoyed safe spaces with entertainment, and opportunities to socialize and be themselves.

Bike Rodeos: Young cycling enthusiasts honed their riding skills, learn about bike safety, and embraced the thrill of two-wheeled adventures through our Bike Rodeos.

Lowrider Bike Program: Twenty-six students designed and fabricated their own lowrider bicycles to keep while building relationships with local law enforcement and the lowrider community.

APD Camp Fearless: Camp fearless showed kids what it means to be a police officer and all the roles they play in our community. This camp created bonds with our officers that last a lifetime, teaching kids that behind the badge is just a regular person that wants the best for our community.

APD Junior Police Academy: Teens that joined to learned more about the careers that we offer. These students were interested in law enforcement and they used this opportunity to immerse themselves and ask questions about the day to day of officers and staff.

Music Classes: Youth were provided ukulele and piano classes at 14 community centers throughout the summer.

Summer of Non-Violence: The

Summer of Nonviolence was created as a strategic response from Albuquerque Community Safety and Bernalillo County to combat the rise in violence during the summer months, aiming to foster a culture of peace and community cohesion.

Bank on Burque: Provided 2,000 backpacks to youth for the 8th Annual Cruzin' into the School Year event.

Lifeguards: Youth lifeguards provided CPR to a patron in cardiac arrest at the Sunport Pool.

New Splashpad: Westgate Community Center

Multi-Generational Programs through

Senior Affairs: Hosted a series of programs and clubs based on Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, Math (STEAM) fitness, nutrition, fine arts and cultural anthropology through intergenerational day programming and events.

Balloon Museum: Created and added "Lighter Than Air Thursday's" - hands-on activities that demonstrate the principles of ballooning.

Mayor's Creative Youth Corps: Worked with 19 youth from 14 different high schools and over 40 adult mentors. The team wrote and directed original song and music video to promote youth City Jobs, and was able to film in the Mayor's Office.

Movies in the Park: Provided family fun at four different events this summer where families enjoyed movies and socialized with their communities.

World Largest Swimming Lesson: Over 105 participants with 32 instructors and volunteers.

Arts & Culture: Summer programming by the community events team entertained more than 150,000 people at low-cost/ no-cost concerts and events. Overall, we hired 182 performers/groups for the summer from Old Town to Albuquerque Summerfest's to BioPark Music. With a variety of opportunities for families to enjoy, there was something for everyone.

Operation Cool Down: Helped families beat the heat this summer by activating sprinklers at 12 different parks on 3 different days when the temperatures reached highest levels.

Community Success in Youth Connect

The Feedback

Youth Connect Programs are dedicated to providing every child in our city with access to enjoyable, enriching summer activities. Accessibility and inclusion are the cornerstones of our programs, open to all youth, regardless of ability, ethnicity, language, economic status, or orientation. In the summer of 2024, our programs reached 123 locations across the city, including community and multigenerational centers, libraries, pools, museums, parks, open spaces, and even the BigPark. We experienced growth in program participation, serving a total of 42,294 young participants.

Connecting youth with every opportunity for success is paramount in Albuquerque. This summer the City partnered with Bernalillo County and brought the Summer of Non-Violence. As we create more spaces for youth to feel safe and be themselves, we want to teach them to create spaces of safety wherever they go.

We continue to pledge to deliver innovative and high-quality programming for all; we

actively seek input from parents to infuse fresh ideas into our offerings. Each year, surveys are distributed to parents and guardians upon the conclusion of the City's Summer Youth Programs. The consistent positive survey results, reflect satisfaction with our programs, staff, and safety measures, motivate Youth Connect to continuously enhance and expand opportunities for youth and families. These survey responses serve as valuable tools, offering insight and foresight for the years ahead.

Through this summer's survey, 79% of families would like to see more youth program options from the City, which is why City staff work diligently every year to expand current programs, create new programs, and increase the awareness of the amazing City programs already in existence.

The Partners

Partnerships are essential for Youth Connect's citywide impact. This summer, we collaborated with over 150 partners to provide diverse activities such as arts, music, dance, swimming, and nature experiences. Providing youth with excellent services takes a massive team.

Youth Connect has created teams within departments as well as outside agencies. In these collaborations we provided hundreds of youth various Teen Nights throughout the summer as well as preparing them for the school year.

To conclude the summer, we were able to give out 2,000 backpacks, 10,880 school supplies and 800 haircut vouchers in two low-income areas of the city.

The Staff

Youth employment is a cornerstone of Youth Connect's mission to foster opportunities and instill life skills for future success. Our youth employees bring the City's summer youth programs to life; their dedication is integral to our success. During the past summer, our youth employees assumed diverse roles, serving as recreation leaders, lifequards, cashiers, instructors for swim, tennis, and pickleball, clerical staff, maintenance personnel, and adventure leaders. Additionally, the Annual Youth Job Fair, which targets young workers aged 14-25, has been a resounding success, with over 900 enthusiastic attendees applying for positions across dozens of city departments, both seasonal and permanent, further demonstrating our commitment to empowering the next generation.

Beyond summer employment, the City hosted two highly successful internship programs: the Job Mentor Program (JMP) and the Mayor's Creative Youth Corps (MCYC). MCYC interns wrote and directed their own music video that they got to film in the Mayor's Office, really celebrating their creativity. These youth employment and internship opportunities offered by the City of Albuquerque not only empower our talented youth but also enrich and invigorate our city.
